

EVERY DAY MATTERS

Murfreesboro City Schools launched a campaign in 2016 to remind parents, students and staff that every day is important. If children don't attend school regularly, they miss out on fundamental reading and math skills. Building a habit of good attendance in early elementary carries into college and careers.

ACE Grant for City Schools

Murfreesboro City Schools continues to address Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) thanks to a grant from the Department of Children's Services. This program enhances social connections within the family and greater community by providing targeted and intensive small group intervention for students who are identified at-risk and then linking the students to available school-based and community services. Likewise, parents receive parent training, support, and are linked with community partners to build positive social connections.

Farm to School

MCS has joined the Farm to School movement and has a state-recognized exemplary program. Farm to School empowers students and their families to make informed food choices and includes nutritional education projects such as school gardens, farm visits, cooking classes, and farm Saturdays. Additionally, all 3rd graders from across the district join for one grand field trip to MTSU's working farm.

Chef Academy

MCS Chef Academy is a unique opportunity for students, grades 3-6, to learn intermediate skills and techniques needed to embark on a lifetime of cooking. Students enrolled in MCS Chef Academy participate in after school classes and compete for a chance to represent their school in an Iron Chef cook-off. A professional chef works with participants on kitchen safety, proper food handling, food preparation, cooking techniques, and presentation.

Special Olympics

MCS students from Black Fox, Cason Lane, Erma Siegel, Northfield, Reeves-Rogers, and Scales join nearly 500 student athletes from across Rutherford County to compete in a day of running, jumping, throwing and overall good spirited competition. 2018 marked the 30th year for the local games.

Backpack Program

The mission of the program is to meet the needs of hungry children by providing them with nutritious and easy-to-prepare food to take home on weekends and school vacations when other resources are not available. The program has been in partnership with Second Harvest Food Bank and many community volunteers for the past nine years.

The Extended School Program (ESP)

ESP serves as an enhancement to the school day, offering students the opportunity to become involved in exciting and enriching activities around the school day hours. ESP is open year-round and gives parents the convenience of safe, school-based care for their child. Over 2,000 students take advantage of ESP opportunities.

Beta Club

Cason Lane and Discovery School students attended the Tennessee Beta Competition and earned the opportunity to participate in National Competition. During the Junior Beta Club competition, MCS students brought home numerous awards including essay, book battle, sculpture and digital photography.



Basketball Champions

The Reeves-Rogers Mustang Girls and the Scales Superstar Boys took the titles of district champion in the MCS basketball league. Teams showed amazing sportsmanship throughout the season. Runner ups for the championship were Bradley Girls and Black Fox Boys.

SSF0s

School Safety and Education Officers are more than protectors. They inspire, teach, and support our students, staff, and families while helping keep our schools safe. Thanks to the partnership with Murfreesboro Police Department, SSEOs became full time members of each school in 2018.

ESP Partners with Murfreesboro Soccer Club

In 2018, ESP and the Murfreesboro Soccer Club partnered to offer students a top-tier soccer experience – Strikers City Academy. Students learn the fundamentals of the game as well as team building and cooperative skills. Soccer is offered through ESP as an after-school enrichment with individual and team play.

Student-led Conferences

Parent teacher meetings no longer just involve the parent and teacher. MCS began student-led conferences across the district in 2016. Student-led conferences actively engage students in the learning process and offer an opportunity for students to produce positives that may not show up on a report card grade. It's is a chance to see work in progress, and places students at the center of discussions.

Leadership Academies

Students, staff members, and teachers have a chance to participate in leadership academies geared to their goals. These academies cover a broad range of leadership topics including personal leadership, team development and goal setting.

Integrated Preschool

The MCS Integrated Preschool offers preschoolers, with and without disabilities, challenging experiences through a language-based curriculum. Traditional preschool students, known as peer models, serve as role models and helpers for their classmates with special needs.

Little Sprouts for Teachers

An employee childcare program, Little Sprouts, opened for the 2017-18 school year. Little Sprouts uses the Creative Curriculum and operates around the school calendar for children ages six weeks to five years old.


