I. CALL TO ORDER BY BOARD CHAIR

The Pledge of Allegiance was led by School Safety Education Officer (SSEO) Daniel Parkhurst. The Pledge was immediately followed by a moment of silence.

II. APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Dr. Brown moved to approve the agenda. Mr. Barrett seconded the motion. All approved by saying aye.

III. COMMUNICATIONS

Dr. Gilbert opened communications by reading and presenting a proclamation recognizing Murfreesboro Police Chief Glenn Chrisman for his dedication and service to Murfreesboro City Schools. Chief Chrisman had previously announced his retirement at the end of this year. Dr. Gilbert and Chair Campbell expressed their deep gratitude for the chief's vision and service to the schools and the community.

Dr. Brown moved to approve Consent Items. Mr. Barrett seconded. All approved by saying aye.

#### V. ACTION ITEMS

Approval of Rezoning Plan

Mr. Anderson reviewed the rezoning plan noting that two public meetings were held and each Board member reviewed the plans individually. He stated that letters were sent to all parents whose children might be affected by the rezoning plan. Mr. Anderson noted that the rezoning would resolve the capacity issue at Reeves-Rogers and take students out of the portables and back into the classroom.

Ms. Phillips commended Mr. Anderson and staff for the very sensitive way the rezoning was handled acknowledging that it is always difficult to manage rezoning. She said she supports the zoning plan. Dr. Brown said it was short notice to Hobgood parents and asked if Mr. Anderson had received any communications from Hobgood parents. Mr. Anderson said the Hobgood parents were also afforded the opportunity to attend Northfield, and there were no calls or comments from any parents. Mr. Barrett commended Mr. Anderson on keeping the communities together. Ms. Smith asked when the next major overhaul would be for rezoning. Mr. Anderson said it would be with the building of the new school.

Ms. Phillips moved to approve the agenda. Ms. Smith seconded. All approved by saying aye.

Ms. Baker reviewed Board Policy STU 64 Sudden Cardiac Arrest Prevention Policy. Ms. Baker explained that this policy must be in effect January 1, 2016, pursuant to state law. She reviewed what the policy entails and explained what it means to MCS identifying three components: training and signature of form by parents, removal of athlete if exhibiting symptoms, requirement for youth athletes to be cleared by a licensed health care professional before being able to return to practice or play. Dr. Brown said it's a policy that will have unintended consequences. He said, as a physician, the policy is not well written. He cited inconsistencies where symptoms are identified. Dr. Brown said athletes may exhibit these symptoms under normal practice such as shortness of breath, and for them to have to be cleared medically will incur a lot of expense. Chair Campbell said the discipline for a coach found in violation of the policy is too lenient. Ms. Rainier recommended removing consequence "b" under number 10 of the policy and replacing it with consequence "c". Ms. Smith said she thinks the policy will put an undue burden on elementary coaches. After further comments from each Board member, the Board collectively decided to move forward with the first reading and contact legislators about the writing of the bill. Ms. Baker provided the reference information - Public Chapter 325, Senate Bill 985, and House Bill 32. Ms. Rainier moved to approve the policy on first reading with the recommended change. Ms. Phillips seconded the motion, and all approved by saying aye.

## VI. REPORTS/INFORMATION

### Inclement Weather/School Closing Procedure

Dr. Gilbert reviewed Administrative Directive STU1 Weather-Related Delay and School Closing to remind the Board and the public of MCS procedures during inclement weather. Dr. Gilbert said we look at the safety of the buses and the children. There are several departments involved in this decision including the Murfreesboro Police Department. Information will be tweeted and all local and Nashville media contacted. Ms. Rainier said she has an issue with the policy that teachers are required to be there when students are allowed to be two hours late. Dr. Gilbert said she prefers to cancel school rather than starting late or closing early because that is confusing, causes absenteeism, and other problems. Mr. King asked if it is possible that the County would cancel school and the City would not. Dr. Gilbert said absolutely, citing differences in roads.

### ESEA/IDEA Report

Ms. Hawkins and Mr. Marlin presented the ESEA/IDEA Report. Exemplary Practices and improvement recommendations. Ms. Hawkins stated that monitors visited MCS October 20-23. She said that, in the past, monitors have been very compliance oriented but the visit was a bit different this time and for the best. She said there was a shift in focus on more about practices that result in good things for students. Ms. Hawkins said the monitors cited two exemplary practices: (1) this district has many community partners from backpack to buddy programs, tutoring, and the CHOW bus; and (2) Mr. Marlin said they were impressed with the school level support plans (CI3T) and that we have them in all of our schools. He said they noticed as they visited schools that they were making a difference for students. Ms. Hawkins said the monitors

also made recommendations. Recommendations included capitalizing on the ways parents can help students be successful in the schools especially since there is already a great deal of parental involvement. Ms. Hawkins said these are just recommendations and not compliance issues. Mr. Marlin said some of their recommendations were things we have already started in the district such as inclusion, comprehensive schedules, and uploading all documentation into a system. Ms. Hawkins said there were two areas they asked us to correct and both happened in the area of record review of two students. One document required several signatures by the parent and one of the signature lines was not signed, and the other instance was that all records had not been received on a student who transferred here from another district.

## VII. OTHER BUSINESS

Ms. Rainier asked if we have moved in the direction of TSBA completing policies. Ms. Baker said yes, that she is completing a questionnaire and should have it to them Thursday.

## VIII. ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business, Mr. Barrett moved to adjourn, and Dr. Brown seconded. The meeting adjourned at approximately 7:08 p.m.

1 **Purpose.** The purpose of this policy is to ensure compliance with the Sudden Cardiac Arrest  
2 Prevention Act codified at Tennessee Code Annotated Section 68-54-101 et seq. relative to youth  
3 sport-related injuries during school youth athletic activity sponsored by the Murfreesboro City  
4 School District.

5  
6 **Definitions.** As used in this policy, unless the context otherwise requires:

- 7  
8 1. "Department" means the department of health;  
9 2. "Health care provider" means a Tennessee licensed medical doctor (M.D.) or an  
10 osteopathic physician (D.O.);  
11 3. "Person" means any individual or governmental entity, corporation, association,  
12 organization, nonprofit institution, or other entity or such entities' representatives; and  
13 4. "School youth athletic activity" means a school organized athletic activity when the  
14 majority of the participants are under eighteen (18) years of age, and are engaging in an  
15 organized athletic game or competition against another team, club, or entity or in practice or  
16 preparation for an organized game or competition against another team, club, or entity.  
17 "School youth athletic activity" does not include an activity which is entered into for  
18 instructional purposes only, or an athletic activity that is incidental to a nonathletic program,  
19 or a lesson.  
20

21 **Policy.**

- 22  
23 1. The Murfreesboro City School Board hereby adopts guidelines and other pertinent  
24 information and forms as approved by the Tennessee Department of Health to inform and  
25 educate coaches, school administrators, youth athletes and their parents or guardians of the  
26 nature, risk and symptoms of sudden cardiac arrest, including the risks associated with  
27 continuing to play or practice after experiencing any of the following symptoms:  
28 a. Fainting or seizures during exercise;  
29 b. Unexplained shortness of breath;  
30 c. Chest pains;  
31 d. Dizziness;  
32 e. Racing heart rate; or  
33 f. Extreme fatigue.  
34

- 35 2. Every year all coaches, whether the coach is employed or a volunteer, and the school  
36 athletic director shall complete a sudden cardiac arrest education program approved by the  
37 Tennessee Department of Health.  
38
- 39 3. Annually, a sudden cardiac arrest information sheet shall be signed and returned by each  
40 coach and athletic director and, if appointed, a licensed health care professional, to the  
41 Director of schools or designee prior to initiating practice or competition for the year.  
42
- 43 4. Annually, a sudden cardiac arrest information sheet shall be provided to and reviewed by  
44 each youth athlete and the athlete's parent or guardian. The information sheet shall be  
45 signed and returned by the athlete's parent or guardian, prior to the youth athlete's initiating  
46 practice or competition, to confirm that both the parent or guardian and the youth athlete  
47 have reviewed the information and understand its contents.  
48
- 49 5. All documentation of the completion of a sudden cardiac arrest education course program  
50 and signed sudden cardiac arrest information sheets shall be maintained for a period of  
51 three (3) years.  
52
- 53 6. Any youth athlete who passes out or faints while participating in an athletic activity or  
54 immediately following an athletic activity, or who exhibits any of the following symptoms  
55 shall immediately be removed from the activity or competition:  
56 a. Unexplained shortness of breath;  
57 b. Chest pains;  
58 c. Dizziness;  
59 d. Racing heart rate; or  
60 e. Extreme fatigue.  
61
- 62 7. A youth athlete who has been removed from play shall not return to the practice or  
63 competition during which the youth athlete experienced symptoms consistent with sudden  
64 cardiac arrest and shall not return to play or participate in any supervised team activities  
65 involving physical exertion, including games, competitions, or practices, until the youth  
66 athlete is evaluated by a health care provider and receives written clearance from the health  
67 care provider for a full or graduated return to play.  
68
- 69 8. After a youth athlete who has experienced symptoms consistent with sudden cardiac arrest  
70 has been evaluated and received clearance for a graduated return to play from a health care  
71 provider, then a school may allow a licensed health care professional, if available, with  
72 specific knowledge of the youth athlete's condition to manage the youth athlete's graduated  
73 return to play based upon the health care provider's recommendations. The licensed health  
74 care professional, if not the youth athlete's health care provider, shall provide updates to the  
75 student's health care provider on the progress of the youth athlete, if requested.  
76
- 77 9. No licensed health care professional or other person acting in good faith within the  
78 authority prescribed under the Sudden Cardiac Arrest Prevention Act shall be liable on  
79 account of any act or omission in good faith while so engaged; provided, that "good faith,"  
80 as used in ~~this act~~ the Sudden Cardiac Arrest Prevention Act, shall not include willful  
81 misconduct, gross negligence, or reckless disregard.  
82
- 83 10. A coach found in violation of ignoring a youth athlete's sudden cardiac arrest symptoms or  
84 allowing the youth to return to the practice or competition during which the youth athlete  
85 experienced the symptoms without written clearance from the health care provider for a full  
86 or graduated return to play shall be subject to at a minimum the following penalties:

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- 87 a. For a first violation, suspension from coaching any school youth athletic activity for  
88 the remainder of the season;  
89 b. For a second violation, suspension from coaching any school youth athletic activity for  
90 the remainder of the season and the next season; and  
91 c. For a third violation, permanent suspension from coaching any school youth athletic  
92 activity.

93 The severity of the disciplinary action may vary depending on the circumstances.

94 11. The Athletic Director or designee shall maintain a data base of all coaches (whether  
95 employees or volunteers) disciplined for violation of this policy.
